Message from the Faculty Advisor

Asha is a wonderful word meaning hope in many Indian languages. When a baby is born and as he goes through his first stages of life into childhood, he is hopeful. He lives in an innocent world where he can be whatever he wishes to be ... an astronaut, a music director, a super hero. But for some children in India, this hope is dashed by harsh reality, the reality of life where daily bread is a struggle and school is a distant luxury. Asha-Purdue is trying to bring that hope back in its own small way, one child at a time. How small is small? For just \$20 a month, we can support the entire educational expense of a child in one of our projects. In the grand scheme of things, in the scheme of 400 million children in India, our work means little. But for that one child who is getting educated, who is learning that life may have its deprivations, but is not empty of hope, that work means a lot.



Empowerment is a grand word and like many grand words, means little to me. But in this effort of Asha Purdue that we all have been a part of, I feel that we ourselves have been empowered. We do not have to passively read depressing stories about India any more. We can do something about it, again in a miniscule way compared to the magnitude of the issue. But we can be an active warrior in this effort, and we will continue to be. Be there with us, through your ideas and through your actions.

Projects we are supporting

MANASA

Manasa is a non-profit organization located in Hyderabad, India working for the welfare and integration of the intellectually challenged by implementing various programs for their development. It all started in 1991 with the initiative of few responsible mothers with a vision to create an adoptive and inclusive society for the better living of the differently-abled. The main objective of this project is to provide necessary training and rehabilitation to children with disabilities such as cerebral palsy, visual impairment, hearing impairment, slower learning capabilities and other physical or learning disabilities. They currently have 57 children and 10 teachers.

In 2011, we sponsored \$6000 to Manasa to help them meet their educational expenses. From conference calls and a site visit we were pleased to see the funds being properly utilized for construction purposes of the new school building. In 2012 our committee decided on further disbursal of \$6000 for supporting six months salaries of the teachers.

We visited the school in January 2013 and the experience was a memorable one; the students were very enthusiastic and excited to interact with us. They had varied inter-ests like music, dance, photography etc. A group of 4 students performed a dance and their enthusiasm was infectious. One student recited shlokas, two others recited some rhymes and another student learnt to use a DSLR camera from us and

took some photographs of the class.

Some of them knew to sign their names and they signed a "Thank You" card for Asha Purdue as a token of their gratitude. The teachers were very patient, well trained, well versed in the special teaching methodologies and highly motivated to make a positive change in the lives of these children. Manasa submitted another proposal for supporting the salaries of their four teachers for the academic year 2013-2014. Seeing the great progress made by this project Asha Purdue chapter approved the proposal and the first installment of \$3000 was sent in May 2013. The project's progress will be reviewed for the next six months before disbursal of another \$3000.

Diksha KHEL (Knowledge Hubs for Education and Learning) Patna project, a joint initiative of Alok Charitable Trust and Diksha Foundation, came into being in December 2010. The project mainly caters to children between 6 to 14 years of age who belong to underprivileged communities, including those sidelined from society on basis of caste. Benefiting children who are either school dropouts for various reasons or who have never been to schools, Diksha prepares them with primary education and makes them ready to join government schools again. They are experimenting with usage of mass media through computers and tablets for classroom education.

Asha Purdue Chapter funded \$3350 to Diksha's Patna center in March 2012 for setting up a computer lab. In July 2012, we visited the facility and interacted with the children. Running in a 3 room rented house the facility appears small but is full of life. Activities involve basic literacy and numeric classes, sports, education regarding child rights and cultural activities. With the new computer lab, children loved spending time on the computer, and their favorite application was drawing on MS paint.

Diksha Patna center submitted another proposal to sponsor their recurring expenses for 2013. Our committee approved this proposal and the first installment of \$4000 was sent in April 2013 which will be reviewed after 6 months. Diksha is also actively participating in the Education Portal initiative of Asha Purdue.

EDUCATION PORTAL

The Education Portal is a unique initiative of Asha Purdue Chapter which aims to supplement the educational needs of deprived children of India. With the Indian Republic now home to almost half of the world's illiterate, the vast majority of whom are children, there is an urgent need to expand the educational infrastructure of the country. However, the road to universal literacy is full of almost insurmountable obstacles, such as the inability of the nation to provide all its children with access to educational materials, and simultaneously ensuring that the educational materials they consume are tailored to their specific needs and are of a sufficiently high standard.

The Education Portal was started with the request made by Diksha in September 2012 for electronic educational content so that they could put their Asha funded computer lab to better use. Asha Purdue chapter enthusiastically took up the challenge and soon Asha Volunteers had a project team up and running to define and achieve the

project's objectives. The activities involve collecting, sorting, rating, enhancing and creating educational content suitable for the socio-economically challenged child population of India. The final aim of the project is to produce a portal where these educational sources could be easily searched, rated and shared. oject is to produce a portal where these educational resources could be easily searched, rated and shared.



Global Fest

Global fest is an annual event at Morton Community Center organised by the City of West Lafayette. This event is a celebration of West Lafayette's many cultures with ethnic food, imported handcrafts, free entertainment, and cultural booths. In this event, Asha Purdue organizes a food stall displaying traditional Indian food. This event is great fundraiser through food sales. Some of the most popular food items are mango lassi, tandoori chicken and veg biryani.





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The 5K event this year was part of the larger Krannert 5K and started outside the Purdue Memorial Union. An estimated 21 team Asha members ran for the cause of underprivileged students in India regardless of the outside temperature of nearly 10 degrees celsius. The photographers were ready to take pictures and capture the event. There was a lot of excitement at the starting line, with people cheering for Team Asha. Slow but steady the runners made their way across the route. The fastest finishers for the Asha team were Ashwin Venkat, Kamesh and Sumeet.

There were free refreshments like coffee, doughnuts and bagels waiting for the finishers at the finish line. The event then followed the prize distribution and ended with a photography session by the Asha members. This event for the whole Asha team was true bonding experience, with runners cheering fellow runners who are gaining fatigue and the hugs at the finish line to have finished such an event, for some, without any prior training. Thanks to support of about 60 donors and IWA, Asha Purdue raised ~\$2,500 in this event.

Tamasha is a fun and fundraising event which is a collection of games like quiz, dumb charades, pictionary and treasure hunt, where students participate together in teams. During the event, food is sold by Asha members for raising funds. Typically the net funds raised from this event is around \$300 and the turnout is around 50-70 students and a few professors. The events

are team based and the winners get coupons from Noodles and Co., Chipotle, Greyhouse, University Bookstore etc. During the food break, there is a Asha awareness presentation for publicising the various events and projects of Asha Purdue. Overall, this is great break for professors and students from their day-to-day rou-

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Asha for Education-Purdue Chapter has supported several educational projects in India over the years. Some of the funds disbursed to projects supported by Asha-Purdue chapter in the past (before 2010) include \$2000 to Ashraya Home for disabled girls in Kollam, Kerala; \$1000 to Suraksha Crisis Center for girls in Neral, Maharashtra; \$1500 to Aikyavardhak Mumbai primary school for slum children; and \$6000 to Saheli Creche for providing non-formal education to children of sex workers in Pune, Maharashtra.

The more recent projects supported by Asha-Purdue include Manasa school for the intellectually challenged in Hyderabad, Andhra Pradesh and Diksha-KHEL learning center to provide supplementary education and vocational training to children of migratory workers and slum dwellers in Patna, Bihar. Asha-Purdue has disbursed a total amount of \$15000 to Manasa school since the beginning of the project in 2011, mostly directed towards salaries of teachers and staff members and is currently continuing support of this project. The Diksha-KHEL project has received a support of \$9600 from Asha-Purdue since 2012, directed towards salaries of teachers as well as purchase of equipment such as printer, scanner, computers etc. and is an ongoing project as well.

The volunteers at Asha for education-Purdue Chapter organize various events throughout the year in order to raise funds to support educational projects for underprivileged children in India. The two main sources of fund-raising by Asha-Purdue since 2004 have been the annual events: Global Fest and Tamasha. Global Fest is a community event organized by the City of West Lafayette, where the Asha volunteers take up a booth, prepare many delicacies and set up food stalls for the visitors, raising funds upto \$400-\$1000 per year. Tamasha, an annual event organized by Asha volunteers consists of various fun games such as Antakshari, Dumb Charades, Quiz etc. along with food sales to raise funds. Apart from these regular events, Asha-Purdue volunteers have also organized some new events since 2012, including cultural shows such as Tarang and Jashn, which raised funds of \$250 and \$800 respectively. One of the main events in the last two years has been the 5K run organized by the Arthritis Foundation of Purdue, in which a large number of volunteers from Asha-Purdue participated to raise funds. The amount raised in the 5K run was \$1900 in 2012 and \$2500 in 2013, including \$1000 raised by Indian Women Association (IWA) members for 5K run, 2013. A part of these funds (\$150 in 2012 and \$100 in 2013) was donated to the Arthritis foundation. An amount of \$1200 was also raised as part of the WAH fund raising efforts of Asha for education. More details about these events are described under the "Events" section of this newsletter. Asha-Purdue also donated an amount of \$100 in 2013 to Project Tribuunka, to aid in the construction of one school for the children of Tribuunka IDP camp in Mogadishu, Somalia. Apart from these events, Asha-Purdue also raises some funds through the sale of merchandise such as T-shirts and calendars. Asha-Purdue continues its dedication in organizing more fund-raising activities, planning and funding new educational projects in India.

In 2012, Asha Purdue actively participated in WAH publicity and fundraising and ended up being in top 5 among all the Asha chapters in terms of participation. Asha Purdue raised \$1,200 with the support of 36 enthusiastic donors and overall the campaign raised \$130,158 to support 13 high quality and high impact projects in India. This year our project Diksha KHEL Patna has been selected for WAH and we hope to continue the momentum and involve more donors and volunteers in supporting quality projects in India.

ICMAP

Indian Classical Music Association of Purdue (ICMAP) is a non-profit organization run primarily by a group of students with a goal to bring Indian music to diverse listeners of the Greater Lafayette area. ICMAP conducted the Purdue Thyagaraja Aradhana in Spring 2012 and 2013, where three of the five Pancharatna kritis were rendered in the traditional style by their performing

group. This was immediately followed by around twenty individual performances by some children and graduate students. At the end of the event Indian snacks like sev puri, pav bhaji, veg puff, vada pav, rasmalai, gulab jamun, mango lassi and chai were



sold to an audience of more than 70 by Asha Purdue Chapter. Through this event Asha Purdue Chapter raised \$220 in 2012 and \$310 in 2013. ICMAP has also collaborated with Asha at other events such as Holi Mela and Boiler Gold Rush.



Q.What kind of learning did you achieve as a manager of this project?

My biggest learning in the past three years and specially engaging in this project has been the realization of the need to focus on holistic education and not be confined to literacy alone. This has created a change in the offerings at the center and our approach towards our work.

Q. Please share any personal thoughts/ interesting experiences about your project.

In the past year we have focused our efforts on making the center an open space. This has led to a change in the traditional hierarchical teacher student roles and relationships. I am sharing a conversation which i had today

Its wedding season here and many children are going to their native villages to attend their relative's weddings. Neha -one of the little ones (5 or 6 years old) is going off for a longish period. She had submitted her

Nagaland leave application.

I asked her:

Tum itnay lambay samay ke liye ja rahi ho? (why are you going for such a long period?)

Haan, ja rahe hain, bhaiya ka shaadi hain Yes, going for elder brother's wedding

Bhaiya ka shaadi - Bhaiya kitne bade hain? (How old is your brother?)

Bahut barre hain !! (He is quite old)

Accha, shaadi ke liye kitna umar hona chahiye?

(Ok, what is the legal age for marriage?) Her friend joined at this time, both said: 18 saal hota hain.

(its 18 years)

Haan ladki ka 18 saal aur ladke ka kya hota hai?

(Yes, for a girl it's 18 years, how many years for a boy?)

21 saal. (21 years)

Kaha se pata chala (From where did you get to know?)

Bas pata hain (We just know)

(The children had enacted plays on the issue of child marriage - it is a problem which exists within the community, especially in the case of girls)

Kaise hoga, parhai choontega, mat jao itna lamba. (Oh, how will it work out? You will miss out on your studies, Don't go for so long.)

Nahi, jaana hain (No i have to go)

I again playfully said: *Mat jao* (please don't go)

Aap Dilli jaate hain, toh hum aapko kuch bolte hain

I dont question you so much when you go to Delhi

(We work on a project in Bulandshahr for which i travel to Delhi frequently.)

I smiled - non- hiearchy is one of the open space principles. Neha's remark is an indicator that we are moving in the right direction.

Q. How would you summarize your experience to motivate others interested in volunteering in your project?

We had a wonderful experience with Laurence Altet, Volunteer from ASHA for Education. She stayed in Patna for a month and taught children dance, creative arts, geography and basic French. Its been a year since she was here, the children still practice the songs taught by her, there have been letter exchanges between her nursery class in Barcelona, Spain and children here. There have also been skype calls between her family and the children here. I am reminded of a quote by a South American educationist - " In a maths class the child does not learn maths, s/he learns how to be with a maths teacher." When children spend time with a motivated teacher/motivator they learn the same values and learn to set high aspirations for themselves.

The social responsibility taken by Asha team at a very young age is noteworthy. MANASA will ever be grateful to Asha for the timely help during its crucial period. we could see a very bright future of MANASA through Asha.



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MY ASHA STORY: ASHPIRATION

I didn't hear about Asha prior to my arrival in Purdue. Last summer, 2012, I was playing tennis in Purdue University Schwartz tennis center while noticed someone playing on side court was wearing a deep blue T-shirt saying 'Asha for Education' on it. On the backside of tee, some smiley-face children were reading books. Upon asking my friend, 'What's that. Asha?', he briefed, 'Oh, a charity organization. They send money to India'. Without continuing further on Asha, he shouted, '60-40, you need to work on backhand'.

Few months later, I was introduced to one Asha volunteer looking for newly admitted students to Asha Purdue chapter. That Fall evening I went to meet Asha Purdue members, they were busy preparing 'Tarang', an annual fund raising event. Some enthusiastic go-go students were practicing dance

medley. Against odds and my inherent images of serious, somber, tightlipped people; president, vice president, secretary, treasurer all were playing and dancing in skit! They were looking for someone, who could store up their moves, memories. So my Asha volunteering started as a photographer.

I used to take pictures of Asha events and post them on Facebook. After working for Asha over nine months, attending meetings and covering different fund raising events, I felt most promising characteristics of Asha are incessant effort, headlong exertion and trusting on their own ability to bring changes, however small it is.

As a grad student I dream about career, internship and publications. When I have time I think about changing India too. I sometime re-

ceive an email asking to donate money, and sometime I respond. If you plan for a year, plant rice. If you plan for little follow up procedure from ten years, plant trees. away from homeland, I console myself, 'What else can I do other than donating money to a charity?'. We all love the results part, but the part that bring results, all those small step by step efforts - I feel that is where Asha holds its nerve. Asha organizes fundraising events to support projects in India. Organization with such intention doesn't necessarily mean we have to confine ourselves with long talks, rumbling ideas. So Purdue Asha group performs dance, drama skit, medley and even dumb charade. All for a noble cause, to save money to fund projects in India.

Initially, I was little cynical about their way of collecting money - selling food, arranging events, running 5k. But there is no magic trick, other than dedication, hard work and commitment. Currently funded projects, seeing their site seeing photos (yes, Asha members do visit India to see progress of their funded projects), I strongly feel, slow but steady, wins the game. After working for Asha, charity is not a process of 'black box' to me anymore. I can see, hear, feel the mechanism inside.

But this is not the end of story. Asha educational portal is under construction, an e-learning facility to millions of children across the globe. We have a faculty advisor, numerous Asha student Alumni, an ex-president from another Asha chapter, few Purdue-info-wizard - there are so much knowledge bank and support, feels lot safer and home-free during work.

I do Asha, because it's a noble cause, it's cool, it's philanthropic and above all, the munificent feeling, that my 15 minutes can change something. Asha goes by as a 'non-profitable' charity organization, but I feel investing time to such organization was the most 'profitable' work I ever did. And I believe people who consider in hundred years plan would admit that too.
